








- Used by regulators, countries, and industry alike.


## MEASURES TAKEN TO ASSIST COUNTRIES WITH THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE BWM CONVENTION

- Promoting Globallast Learning Portal







preparecines, response and cooperation (OPRC) is to provide a global framework for international cooperation and mutual assistance in combating major oil spill incidents. In 2000, a Protocol to the OPRC 1990 was adopted to encompass hazardous and noxious substances (OPRC-HNS Protocol).

Civil Liability and Fund Conventions
Under the auspices of IMO, a 3-layer compensation
system was developed. The primary layer is the
International Convention on Civil Liability for Oil Pollution

#### MARPOL

The International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (MARPOL) is the main international convention covering prevention of pollution of the marine environment by ships from operational or accidental causes. It also covers atmospheric pollution under Annex VI.

#### Anti-fouling systems Convention

The International Convention on the Control of Harmfu Anti-fouling Systems on Ships prohibits the use of harmful organotins in anti-fouling paints used on ships and establishes a mechanism to prevent the potential future use of other harmful substances in anti-fouling systems

Ballast Water Management Convention

Organization for the Global Ballast Water Mangement Partnership Programme (Globallast). This GEF/UNDP/ IMO project aims to reduce the transfer of hamful aquatic organisms and pathogens in ships ballast water, through assisting countries to implement the IMO ballast water guidelines and prepare for the entry into force of the International Convention for the Control and Management of Ships Ballast Water & Sediments, 2004 (BWM Convention).
